An interdisciplinary field trip program featuring the award-winning exhibition, *The Sailing Circle: 19th Century Seafaring Women from New York*.

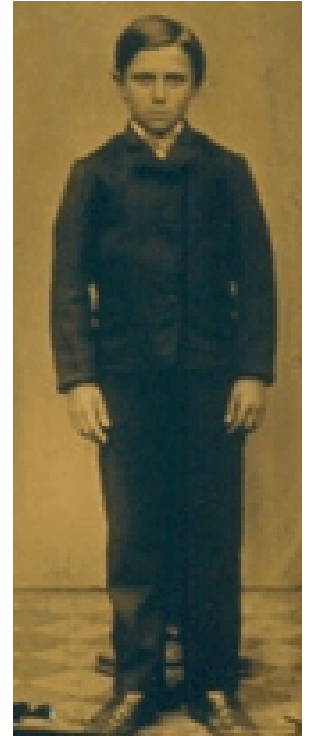
Walk where the sailing ships were built.

Receive a copy of *Discover Setauket*. Understand how to use document-based local history questions.



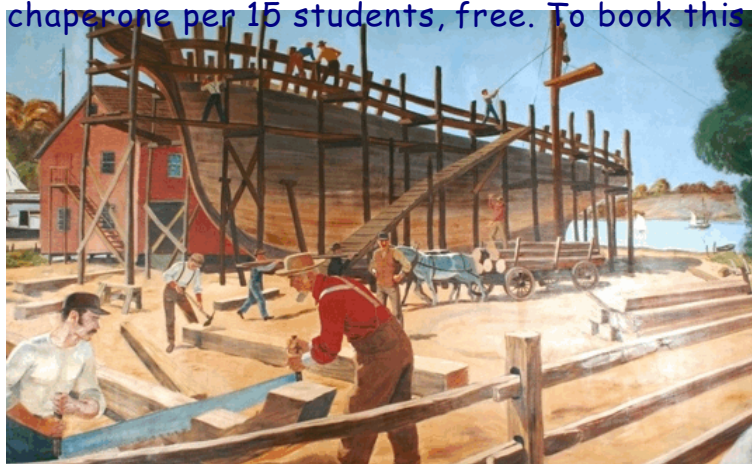
